Cross-functional teams in industry, education, and local [state] government need to come together to formulate new ideas, select programs that are working well to sustain them, and eliminate outdated programs. This would part of a long-term comprehensive plan to make higher education more affordable.

18. The North Star Promise is expected to result in an increase in enrollment on our campuses. Many of these students are projected to be disproportionately first-generation students and students from historically underserved communities. As a legislator, what would you do to ensure these students had the support they needed to be successful?

In order to be successful, additional programs for social services and support could be offered. Many families of underserved communities make great sacrifices to help their family members enroll in higher education. There should not be financial hardship where the student must choose to leave school as a result. Also, post-graduation, good relationships with industries to improve placement opportunities could be further improved. In the City of Arlington, for example, there is a business that recruits students who are enrolled in trade school for welding skills; they are hired contingent on completing their program and this results in s good flow of new employees and allows for better success of the individual.

High-quality professional educators

20. What will you do to help recruit and retain high-quality educators in our classrooms?

Attracting and retaining high-quality educators is a factor at all levels E-12 and beyond. Perhaps there could be clubs in the public schools (secondary) that promote "Future Educators of Minnesota" to encourage students to pursue a teaching career, to improve the flow of potential educators. Retention relies on other factors, not only compensation, and our communities must recognize that retaining high-quality teachers and education professionals involves higher costs. In Greater Minnesota, schools districts are finding that bond bills are less likely to pass. Limits to spending within the school districts often impede step increases in compensation for educators, and result in loss of programs for a well-rounded education.

Standardized testing

21. What individual or system-level decisions in education do you believe are appropriate to make based on standardized test scores?

Reliance on standardized test scores has been largely criticized as testing does not appear to be as effective as was hoped. The popularity of standardized tests is waning. I would support legislation for programs to be expanded for marginalized students, where they may exhibit their skills and level of learning in ways aside from standardized testing.

Honesty in Education

22. Most educators believe students should have access to a wide range of age-appropriate books that include relatable characters and situations that reflect the diversity of Minnesota families. However, certain politicians and big money groups are trying to remove books from school libraries across America, particularly books with LGBTQ+ characters or those that deal with racism in America. This issue falls under the First Amendment rights guaranteed by our US Constitution. Court cases in other states that have already validated rights of Freedom to Read, where schools at the local level have attempted to remove or restrict access. We must

continue to press for access to a wide range of media even when it represents parts of our culture or history that may or may not agree with our values. As a legislator, I would promote and support similar Freedom to Read laws to retain this right. We must encourage abilities of students to think critically. I believe that current attempts for legislation in Minnesota will gain positive ground to keep our options open when it comes to access to books and other media, and I will advocate for this legislation.

Your role as a legislator

Have you visited a public school in your district in the past year? If so, which one? What were your observations from your visit? How will that experience inform your work as a legislator? If not, when did you last visit a school? Would you like us to help arrange a visit?

I have visited a public school for adult-enrichment activities within the past year. The facilities are modern and it occurs to me that some districts do not have up-to-date buildings. I will be attending school board meetings within District 17B and this will give me the opportunity to seek ideas and better understand the challenges currently faced by schools. A current issue in our community involves saving the public pool in our schools district. Due to lack of funding for maintenance, there is a good chance we will lose our school-based pool after about 50 years of operation. This is causing a lot of discontent in our community, and is only one example of how inflation and the local economy is impacting our school services.

What have you done to become informed on issues relating to public education? What organizations and individuals do you go to for your information?

I graduated from a post-secondary university with a degree in education (focus on music education for K-8). I did not pursue a teaching position upon graduating (due to cuts in funding for fine arts when I was about to enter the profession). My husband and I raised four children who attended public schools, and I have followed issues related to public education throughout this time. When I served on the Arlington City Council, the local school administration worked closely with the city on shared programs such as community education. Education Minnesota, school boards and teacher organizations are good resources for seeking information on current issues and roadblocks.

I also have a close family member who is on the autism spectrum (junior-high school student in a public metropolitan (Twin Cities) school. The environment is not conducive to his learning since the special-needs students are combined into one classroom setting, and are not mainstreamed. The stipulations in his Individualized Education Program are not adhered to, and this results in a less-than-adequate learning experience. Organizations that specialize in programs for autism and similar areas could partner

with public schools to assure that all of the necessary tools and resources are provided to help students become contributing members in society. There must be more accountability on the part of the district to guarantee that each student receives the best experience possible. This of course requires that professional educators have the training, tools and resources to provide that experience.

How do you envision working with Education Minnesota if you are elected/reelected? If you disagree with us on an issue, how will you communicate that?

Education Minnesota in particular should be involved in decisions that impact educators. I have strong beliefs about the value of public education and would rely on the Education Minnesota organization to assist with ideas for better legislation. As with any subject where there is disagreement, compromise and problem-solving techniques should be employed to come to an agreement.

If elected/reelected, how will you balance competing priorities that might exist between Education Minnesota and other education groups?

In my career in corporate business, cross-functional teams were formed to identify the highest-priority problems, seek common ground, and formulate new policies or methods to remove barriers. Quality tools and resources may be helpful to enable the groups to collaborate effectively. I have led or participated in many working sessions where good practices were followed to produce successful results; these may also be applied for education groups to come together. I am a proponent of good quality education and strongly believe that a good balance can be achieved.
