How will you support unions as a state legislator?

Ann Johnson Stewart

On the picket line (if needed)! Meet with union members and make sure that their issues are addressed.

Kathleen Fowke

A careful review of Fowke's campaign website, social media, and public statements has revealed no indication that she supports labor and collective bargaining.

How will you support efforts to lower inequitable penalties in the Teachers Retirement Association to expand retirement options?

Ann Johnson Stewart

I will take the cue from experts in this area. My parents were able to retire and live well on their pensions, and I know how important that is. Teachers work HARD and deserve a worry-free retirement.

Kathleen Fowke

A careful review of Fowke's campaign website, social media, and public statements has not revealed her stance on the penalties for teacher pensions.

What will you do to help recruit and retain high-quality educators in our classrooms?

Ann Johnson Stewart

Pay them more.

Make the amount of money they spend on supplies a TAX CREDIT. Give them more prep time and days off.

Kathleen Fowke

A careful review of Fowke's campaign website, social media, and public statements has revealed no plan to invest in high-quality Minnesota teachers. However, she has expressed a willingness to make cuts to Minnesota's budget, which pays for public education, in favor of tax cuts.¹
